

Scrimshaw: The Whaleman's Art Curt Martin, Wednesday, May 22, Wellesley College Club Refreshments at 7 pm, Talk at 7:30 pm

This presentation explores the art produced by American whalemen, principally on 19th century whaling cruises, and investigates what motivated whalemen to engage in this unique craft.


Scrimshaw is defined as practical and decorative items made by whaling crews from the materials at hand, mainly the teeth and bone of whales. Through Powerpoint Curt Martin will examine the raw materials used, the tools employed, and the techniques for producing scrimshaw. We'll view practical gift items such as boxes, baskets, kitchen utensils, canes, and sewing implements—and best-known of all, engraved sperm whale teeth.

A member of Wellesley Neighbors, Curt has been a Wellesley resident since 1979. He earned a BA at Harvard College and a PhD from the Tufts Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy and taught International Relations at Merrimack College from 1974 to 2012.



The author of two books, Curt has written numerous articles and case studies in international and foreign policy. He has had a lifelong interest in the history of American whaling and has given lectures on whaling around New England for various groups, including Wellesley Neighbors in 2016

From the Executive Director: Medical Bill Shock



A recent University of Chicago survey indicates that 57% of American adults receive bills not covered by their insurance. The use of out-of-network medical professionals and hospitals is the leading cause of unexpected bills. Check to make sure that your doctors and preferred hospital are

in your insurance network. Understand that surprise bills can come from a radiologist, anesthesiologist or

other medical professional who works at your hospital but isn't part of your network. If you're going to a hospital for a procedure, treatment or surgery, verify beforehand with admissions or billing that all of your services will be by in-network providers.

If you receive a surprise invoice you can file an appeal with your insurance company. Your physician or surgeon may be able to help explain and justify why you went out of your network. Be vigilant and take action to avoid invoice shock.

May 15: Aging in Place? For those of us intent on remaining in our homes for the foreseeable future, what do we need to do to succeed? Among the topics for discussion are making our homes "elder-friendly," establishing monitoring systems, identifying qualified home and health assistance, and understanding the potential financial implications, especially compared with the costs of *not* staying at home.

A Proclamation for Hank Solomon

Many Wellesley Neighbors attended the final show of the Highland Jazz series on Sunday afternoon, March 31, at Newton South High School. Besides enjoying the jazz, they wanted to show their gratitude for the series—a longtime staple of the WN events calendar and for its guiding spirit, Hank Solomon.

The show was bittersweet for Hank but began with a happy surprise. At the last minute, the Mayor of Newton asked to say a few words, and who could say no? She then presented a proclamation in honor of Hank's years of work with Highland Jazz, which he and his wife Jane display here [re: photo]. Jane has helped a lot with the series, as have sons Scott and Peter, their wives, Carol and Gretchen, their two grandchildren, Sadie and Eliza—and old friends like Alan and Judy Frommer.

WN newcomers may not know that the Solomons are founding members and that Hank served as the first Clerk on Executive Committee of Wellesley at Home (now Wellesley Neighbors) and the Board of Directors. He has been instrumental in forging our links with Wellesley College and establishing the very popular monthly men's lunch at the Wellesley College Club. He feels that Wellesley Neighbors is now a legacy to the Town of Wellesley.

Hank grew up in the Red Hook section of Brooklyn and majored in English at the University Heights Bronx campus of NYU, serving as sports editor and managing editor of its newspaper. He took ROTC and was commissioned as a lieutenant in the infantry (US Army) and then pursued an early career in journalism and sports writing. His first job was Assistant to the Publisher at *Amateur Athlete Magazine*, for which he

covered the first US/Russian international track meet in Philadelphia in July 1959. (Recently, he discovered that WN member Mickey Goldin attended the same meet as the University of Pennsylvania track manager.)

Hank gained some radio experience and had his own

radio/TV placement service and talent agency in Boston, renting space from a law firm that represented BMI (Broadcast Music Incorporated). Urged by his legal friends, he started at Suffolk Law School but instead, by degrees, moved into the investment world, specifically the new field of financial planning. He established and managed his own investment firm, then worked for JMB Realty, American Express Financial Advisors, and Acadient Inc. He's been retired for about 20 years.

His wife Jane is co-leader of the WN Hills Cluster and has often hosted WN events in the Solomon home. A native

of Greenfield, MA, she trained as a psychiatric social worker and practiced at many institutions when she wasn't at home with her children. A graduate of Wheaton College and Simmons College Graduate School of Social Work, she later studied at Northeastern Graduate School of Criminal Justice, inspired by her work at the Framingham Women's Prison.

The Solomons married in 1966. They have three children, Scott, Tracy and Peter and two grandchildren. In addition, Jane and Hank hosted BU students from Hong Kong, beginning in 1986, and one remains especially close. "He and his wife live in Needham with their two children, and they call us Nana and Grampy," Jane says.
