The Wellesley Dentist Who Discovered Anesthesia Dr. Marc Kaufman, Wednesday, June 26, Wellesley College Club Refreshments at 7 pm, Talk at 7:30 pm

William T.G. Morton, who lived in Wellesley (then West Needham) from March 1846 until he died in



1868, is widely credited with discovering anesthesia. His first public demonstration of ether anesthesia took place on October 16, 1846, during a surgical procedure at the Massachusetts General Hospital.

Morton was a dentist, prizewinning farmer, entrepreneur,

opportunist, and serial swindler—a fascinating character who left an indelible mark on medicine and on those who knew or did business with him. This program describes key events, places, and relationships in Morton's life, including those related to the discovery of anesthesia, some of which occurred at his parents' home. Originally sited near the intersection of Washington Street and Route 135 (across the street from the main branch of today's Wellesley Free Library), this house is now located at 33 Cottage Street. Marc Kaufman is an Associate Professor of Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School and is based at McLean Hospital in Belmont, Massachusetts. He received his BA degree from Wesleyan University in Middletown, Connecticut, and his PhD from Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, Maryland. He did his postdoctoral training at the New England Primate Research Center in Southborough, Massachusetts, and at McLean. He has co-authored more than 80 peer-reviewed scientific publications.

Marc is a co-inventor on a patent covering the use of xenon gas to treat post-traumatic stress disorder, which catalyzed his interest in studying William Morton and the history of anesthesia. He mentors young investigators and co-directs an NIH postdoctoral training program at McLean.

In 2010, he received both the Jack H. Mendelson Memorial Research Award (for contributions to research into substance abuse) and a NARSAD Independent Investigator Award. The following year he was honored with the Michael J. Fox Foundation Rapid Response Innovation Award.

A New Look for the WN Website

In March, a new video appeared on the WN home page, and since then the website has seen a subtle but thorough makeover. The video and other changes are the work of an ad hoc committee including Nancy Gans, Mickey Goldin, Dorothy Howells, Dan Kemp, and Lucy Phillips (chair). It also includes Joyce Wadlington, whose subcommittee is updating the WN brochure.

Put text on the bottom of all pages that gives the WN name, address, telephone number and email.

Formatted blocks of text to be easier to read (except for pages representing "built-in functions" from CE, which we cannot change).

Finally, Peter Offenhartz of the Technology Committee joined the group to help implement website changes, with Dan's able assistance. When really tough problems arose, they turned to founding webmaster Stan Treitman for the solution.

In April and May, the committee met weekly at Dan's house, taking

advantage of his large computer screen. The group could discuss changes that Dan and Peter would enact then or later. The goal was to accomplish as much as possible before summer, when Peter and Dan will be mostly out of town.

"Our main objective was to make the site more attractive to non-members who are looking for information about Wellesley Neighbors," Dan says. "We also made changes to what members see when they sign in. Whenever possible we made the text larger and easier to read."

Peter adds, "It's finished for now but may be revisited in the fall." He and Dan discovered that they could work easily with Club Express (CE), the website manager for WN and other villages. Moreover, they could make changes without interfering with anyone using the website.

Next time you visit, notice that they have:

Added a background color (turquoise, in tune with the WN logo) to flank the home page and others, making the entire experience of using the website more colorful.

Added boxes on text pages to provide standardized page headers and subheadings. Boxes are WN lavender with white letters and

match our menu tabs.

- Made the layout more simple and symmetrical.
- Put a concise statement of who we are in the most visible place: the top left.
- Added a visual link to our video, which when clicked goes to the start of the video.
- Moved the event list to righthand side of the page.
- Added a slide show at bottom right for increased visual interest. The slides can be easily changed to keep them current.

Last but not least: next time you access our site on your cellphone, you'll see that it's been reformatted to be more easily readable on a mobile or tablet device.

The video and website may yet need fine-tuning—and user feedback is welcome. But the ad hoc committee will turn next to the WN brochure, on which work is already under way.
