Dr. Marjorie Agosin: "Chile: a Country at the End of the World" Tuesday, November 26, Wellesley College Club Refreshments at 7 pm, Talk at 7:30 pm

Marjorie Agosin will speak about the history of Chile since the middle of the twentieth century, with a special focus on the Allende and the Pinochet years. The talk also will address important literary works that defined




these years. Dr. Agosin is a poet, human rights activist, and Professor of Spanish at Wellesley College. She is a prolific author, and her works include *An Absence of Shadows, A Cross and a Star: Memoirs of a Jewish Girl in Chile, Women, Gender and Human Rights,* and *Dear Anne Frank: Poems.* She is a well-known spokesperson for the plight and priorities of women in Third World countries.

Among her awards are the United Nations Leadership Award in Human Rights, the Chilean government Gabriela Mistral Medal of Honor for Life Achievement, the Pura Belpré Award, the Letras de Oro, the Latino Literary Prize, and the Peabody Award. She received her bachelor's degree from the University of Georgia and her advanced degrees from Indiana University.

From the Health Support Committee: "Alzheimer's Disease— Why We Lack Effective Treatments and What You Can Do About It" Dr. Marc Kaufman, Thursday, November 21, 3 pm-4:30 pm, Room 413 Lulu Chow Wang Campus Center, Wellesley College

Late onset Alzheimer's Disease (AD), the most common form of dementia, is typically diagnosed in the eighth decade of life. Currently, we lack effective treatments for this disorder. This presentation will describe how beta-amyloid and tau proteins are thought to cause AD, and how aging, sleep, genes, environment, and combinations of these factors increase the risk for its development. Also discussed are potential reasons we lack effective AD treatments and personal steps we all can take to reduce the risk for developing AD.

An Associate Professor of Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School, Marc is based at McLean Hospital in Belmont, MA. He received his BA from Wesleyan University in Middletown, CT, in 1983, and his PhD from Johns Hopkins





Marc leads and collaborates on research studies of substance abuse, post-traumatic stress disorder, HIV, and neurodegenerative disorders including Parkinson's and Alzheimer's Diseases, in humans and in animal models. He has co-authored more than 80 peer-reviewed scientific publications and has reviewed grant applications for the NIH and other institutions. A dedicated mentor of young investigators, Marc co-directs an NIH postdoctoral training program at McLean Hospital. His recent awards include the Jack H. Mendelson Memorial Research Award for outstanding contributions to research in substance abuse; a NARSAD Independent Investigator Award, and a Michael J. Fox Foundation Rapid Response Innovation Award.
